The quarterly marking system uses numerical grades. Academic standing is based on grade point average, which is calculated using all course grades. All courses are unweighted, with the exception of Advanced Placement courses, which are weighted .02 at the end of each semester.

Graduation With Distinction

An honors program emphasizing rigor, independence and follow-through. Requires: rigorous class selection (in bold); two 2-4 month independent, self-designed projects applying academics to real world situations; and two semester-long thesis defenses. Only 3-8 students per year complete.
